Aspire Respect Responsibility Resilience

To begin the school year all grades across the school were involved in the Start Up Program, where students explored our school values of Aspire, Respect, Responsibility and Resilience through a range of activities that promote self-awareness and co-operative learning. In addition to this, classroom routines were established, and behaviour expectations made clear so as to create a positive learning environment.

School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (S.W.P.B.S.)

at Keilor Heights P.S.

We are a school that uses the S.W.P.B.S. frameworks to foster positive learning environments where students feel happy, safe and engaged in their learning. Students are encouraged to make positive choices in their behaviour and learning and are rewarded for displaying our school values in all settings across the school. Teachers have begun introducing 'Khoins' as our universal reward token system and are in the process of using student voice to determine reward outcomes. This week the Wellbeing Team of staff will meet to reflect on past practices and procedures and organise prizes for the first Khoin Trade shop for 2023 in the coming weeks. Students will have the opportunity to trade their 'Khoins' for a prize in recognition of their positive behaviour.

The K.H.P.S. Schoolwide Positive Behaviours Expectation Matrix identifies behaviours expected by our whole school community. This document can be found in every learning space and shared environment throughout the school. A copy of the matrix is provided on the next page.

RESILIENCE RIGHTS & RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS The **Respectful Relationships Program** is in its second year of implementation at KHPS. As part of social and emotional learning and respectful relationships, all classes are embedding this program into their classroom curriculum throughout the year. The Respectful Relationships Program is a requirement of the *Department of Education and Training* as a recommendation from the Royal

Commission in 2016. It is a prevention strategy in schools that aims to create an environment that fosters safety, respect, equal opportunity, gender equality, voice and improved cultural awareness.



The Berry Street Education Model is another teaching and learning strategy we implement here at KHPS. The model is designed around the notion of 'All students must have the apportunity to understand themselves and how they learn', BSEM, 2021. A group of staff attended a professional development workshop last year and we have booked another group of teachers to attend In Term 3 this year. Staff and students continue to explore a variety of brief activities that engage, redirect and explore one's own thinking in a fun and co-operative manner. These activities may include:

- Marning Welcome Circle
- Brain Breaks
- Emotional Literacy
- Self- Regulation strategies
- Being Ready to Learn
- Engagement/ motivation
- Self-Care

WHO OR WHAT IS SMIC?

SMIC IS AN ACRONYM. One of those clever little words made out of the first initials of a name or phrase. It stands for School Maintenance Improvement Committee.

WHO RUNS SMIC? Parents and carers of students in our in our school community. SMIC is a sub-committee of the KHPS School Council. SMIC would love a couple of new school members to join its committee, enabling it to do more and generate fresh ideas. (SMIC only meets when needed to plan and activate a grounds project).

WHAT DOES SMIC DO? First and foremost, work on making the school grounds a better space to learn and play in for KHPS students. It also makes proactive decisions that ensure the grounds are a safe place for everyone and are are kept maintained. Sounds impressive? It is!

WHO FUNDS SMIC? You! The fund raising efforts initiated by the school (mainly through The Parents and Friends Group) are its general source of funding. Plus (if it is successful) any local, school, business or government grants. There is also a pool of funds that come from the education department, however they are set aside to maintain the grounds. (Eg. Repair or replace shade sails that tear, audit playground equipment, add soft fall to playground areas to achieve levels of safety accreditation. All critical, but seemingly, the unexciting funds).

WHAT IS SMIC PLANNING FOR 2023? Lots! Starting with a Grounds Improvement Morning (Working Bee) in March/April to complete a new turf area near the prep 1-2 playground, then we have our eye on the new oval. We're also planning to revamp the Sensory Garden amongst other ideas.

AND FINALLY, SMIC IS YOURS. Local schools are only as good as the families who choose to support the efforts of the volunteer committees and groups the school needs to run them. If you have inspiring ideas on how to improve KHPS, want to help or share some advice (good or bad) then reach out! We'll always listen and support the needs of our school families with work and effort that provides continual improvement and care of students.





KHPS House Cross-Country/Buckley District Interschool Cross-Country Trials (Years 3-6)

This year's KHPS House Cross-Country/Buckley District Interschool Cross-Country Trials for students in years 3-6 will take place on Tuesday, April 4th (last week of term 1). On this day, all students and teachers in years 3, 4, 5 and 6 will walk down to Steele's Creek/Spring Gully Reserve in Keilor East (near Valley Lakes) to complete either the 2km run (10 years old this year and younger) or 3km (11 years old this year and older).



Students turning 10 years old or under in 2023 (born 2013, 2014 and 2015) will complete 3 x laps of approximately 670m (2km).

Every lap completed of the circuit shown will earn house points which will go towards awarding the House Cross-Country Shield for 2023.

The event is also a qualification opportunity for students (top 6 in each age group/gender) who are keen runners and have ambitions to represent KHPS at the Buckley District Cross-Country Event which will be held in Term 2, Week 2 at Brimbank Park.

Students may have different goals on the day but the focus will be on having fun, being active, and doing their best to run/walk as many laps as they can in the allocated time.
